GRAND CANYON-PARASHANT NATIONAL MONUMENT

Grand Canyon-Parashant National Monument, located on the northern edge of the Grand Canyon, was established by Presidential proclamation on January 11, 2004. The 1,050,563-acre monument encompasses lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management and the National Park Service; two agencies sharing staff and resources for a common purpose.

The story of this land is rich and long, shaped by natural forces and human history. Remote, open, and undeveloped, the monument displays vast landscapes. From the Mohave Desert to ponderosa pine forests. The diverse resources of this land have attracted many. John Wesley Powell and Clarence Dutton provided striking written descriptions of the geology, flora, and fauna during their exploration of the area in the 1870s.

Cultural sites provide valuable clues that indicate humans have inhabited this area for 11,000 years. Each group left evidence of their time here, such as petted and painted rock images, habitation sites, tools, and quivers, which help us recognize them as distinct units and gives us insight into their lives. One such group, the Southern Paiute Tribe, continues to maintain their ties to the area.

Corals, fences, water tanks, swimblows, and other remnants of early homesteads are still scattered across the monument. The story of the settlers, their largely secluded lifestyles, and their determination to ranch, farm, and raise a family is told through these cultural landscapes. Ranching continues to be a way of life for many of those same families' descendants.

The monument contains only unimproved roads and visitor services are not available. Though the remoteness and sense of freedom the monument provides is the draw for many, this amazing experience must be tempered with caution, preparedness, and complete self-reliance.
